





The University of Pittsburgh at a Glance

The University of Pittsburgh of the Commonwealth System of Higher Education is a nonsectarian, coeducational, state-related, public research university. It is internationally respected as a center for learning and research. The University was founded in a log cabin near the confluence of Pittsburgh's three rivers in 1787 as a small, private school named the Pittsburgh Academy, renamed in 1819 as the Western University of Pennsylvania, and then renamed again in 1908 as the University of Pittsburgh. The University became state-related in 1966.

Since its founding 217 years ago, the University of Pittsburgh has established itself as the most comprehensive educational complex in the region. It provides a wide range of academic programs and services for the Pittsburgh metropolitan area's population of 2.4 million. With an enrollment of nearly 34,000 students, the University accounts for approximately 5.2 percent of all students enrolled in institutions of higher education in Pennsylvania. Supporting the needs and interests of the University are nearly 12,000 faculty, research associates, and staff. From an economic standpoint, the University has an important impact on the area economy with 1.3 billion dollars being contributed to the region annually.

The University comprises five campuses. The 132-acre Pittsburgh Campus is located in Oakland, which is the City of Pittsburgh's cultural and medical center. The University's four regional campuses are located in western Pennsylvania, in Johnstown, Greensburg, Titusville, and Bradford.

There are approximately one hundred academic, research, and administrative buildings, and residence halls, located at the Pittsburgh Campus. Of prominence is the 42story Cathedral of Learning, which is one of the tallest academic buildings in the world. Visitors from around the world have toured the famed Nationality Rooms, located in the Cathedral of Learning, which are functional classrooms representing the heritages of the region's many ethnic groups. The Pittsburgh Campus is comprised of 16 undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools. These schools include the School of Arts and Sciences; the College of General Studies; the University Honors College; the Joseph M. Katz Graduate School of Business and College of Business Administration; the Schools of Education, Engineering, Law, Social Work, and Information Sciences; the Graduate School of Public and International Affairs, and the University's six schools of the health sciences. These schools include the Graduate School of Public Health and the Schools of Dental Medicine, Health and Rehabilitation Sciences, Medicine, Nursing, and Pharmacy.

As for academic offerings, the Pittsburgh Campus schools offer undergraduate and graduate certificate programs and baccalaureate, master's, and first professional degree programs. The regional campuses offer undergraduate certificate programs and associate and baccalaureate degree programs. Overall, the University offers nearly 400 distinct degree programs, augmented by numerous dual, joint, and cooperative degree program options. In fiscal year 2003, the University conferred 7,361 degrees.

The University of Pittsburgh is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools and additionally by various specialized accrediting agencies. It is a member of the Association of American Universities, which is an organization that comprises 62 leading doctorate-granting research institutions in the United States and Canada.

The University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC), affiliated with the University of Pittsburgh's schools of the health sciences, is the premier health care system in western Pennsylvania and is one of the largest integrated delivery systems in the country. UPMC, rated as one of the best health care systems in the country, is dedicated to providing exemplary patient care, educating the next generation of health care professionals, and advancing biomedical research. The health system includes 20 tertiary, specialty, and community hospitals; more than 300 community-based treatment locations: and a wide range of health-related services such as: rehabilitation services, in-home services, senior living options, durable medical equipment, technology transfer ventures, and international health care initiatives. UPMC Health Plan provides a range of commercial, Medicaid, and Medicare products.

Numerous athletic and cultural events are sponsored by the University throughout the year. Cultural events include art exhibits, theatre performances, music workshops, and concerts.

The University continues to make great strides in furthering its commitment to offering quality education, research, and public service to its communities locally and throughout the world. Undergraduate applications have increased 140% in the last ten years. From fiscal year 1995 to fiscal year 2004, the University's endowment has grown from just over \$460 million to nearly \$1.4 billion. During that same time, annual research expenditures grew from about \$230 million to nearly \$555 million. The University has recently risen to be ranked in tenth place nationally in regards to receiving federal science and engineering research and development dollars. Pitt is furthering its efforts to become one of the finest, most productive universities in the world.

Fact Book Highlights

General Information

- The University of Pittsburgh (Pitt) comprises five campuses: the Pittsburgh Campus and four regional campuses. Pitt's regional campuses are located in western Pennsylvania at Johnstown, Greensburg, Titusville, and Bradford.
- In addition to institutional accreditation by the Middle States Association, Pitt holds numerous specialized accreditations among its various schools and programs in, but not limited to, such areas as business, education, engineering, law, nursing, pharmacy, psychology, and medicine.

Student Information

- In Fall Term, 2003, Pitt enrolled 33,792 students, including 26,795 students at the Pittsburgh Campus and 6,997 students at the regional campuses.
- Of the students enrolled at the University in Fall Term, 2003, 81 percent were full-time, 72 percent were undergraduates, 12 percent were minorities, 53 percent were female, 81 percent were from Pennsylvania, and five percent were international students.
- Pitt students originated from 49 states, the District of Columbia, and two U.S. territories, as well as from 124 foreign countries. The top five countries of origin were: China, India, Republic of Korea, Taiwan, and Japan.

Degree and Certificate Programs

- The University includes the Pittsburgh Campus, wherein are housed 16 undergraduate, graduate, and first professional schools, and four undergraduate regional campuses. In addition to numerous certificate and degree program options, Pitt offers 396 distinct degree programs, including: 14 associate, 180 baccalaureate, 124 master's, 73 doctoral, and five first professional programs.
- Pitt conferred 7,361 degrees in fiscal year 2003. At the Pittsburgh Campus, there were 3,667 baccalaureate, 1,861 master's, 348 doctoral, and 539 first professional degrees conferred. At the regional campuses, there were 93 associate and 853 baccalaureate degrees conferred.

Faculty and Staff Information

- Employed at the University in Fall Term, 2003 were 4,533 faculty. Of the 3,690 full-time faculty, 19 percent were minorities, 36 percent were female, and 88 percent had the doctorate or first professional degree as their highest earned degree.
- In Fall Term, 2003, 23 percent of the full-time faculty were professors, 24 percent were associate professors, and 39 percent were assistant professors.
- There were 6,752 staff employed at the University in Fall Term, 2003. Of the 6,339 full-time staff, 15 percent were minorities and 62 percent were female.

Financial Information

 Pitt's fiscal year 2003 expenses in instruction, research, public service, and various other expense categories totaled \$1.2 billion.

Research Information

- Research activities are conducted at the University in its schools and in its 260 centers, institutes, laboratories, and clinics.
- Pitt is a member of the Association of American Universities (AAU), a select group of institutions which collectively perform a major share of university-based research in the U.S. and Canada.

Library Collections and Services

 In fiscal year 2003, the University's 29 libraries and collections housed more than 4.7 million volumes. Additionally, there were more than 4.4 million pieces of microforms, 25,500 print subscriptions, and 9,000 electronic journals.

Institutional Advancement

- In fiscal year 2003, Institutional Advancement programs raised \$94 million in contributions from private sources.
- More than 220,600 Pitt alumni reside throughout all 50 states, three U.S. territories, and in 160 countries.

Mission Statement

The University of Pittsburgh, founded in 1787, is one of the oldest institutions of higher education in the United States. As one of the nation's distinguished comprehensive universities, the resources of the University constitute an invaluable asset for the intellectual, economic, and social enrichment of Pennsylvania, while the international prestige of the University enhances the image of Pennsylvania throughout the world.

The University's mission is to:

- provide high-quality undergraduate programs in the arts and sciences and professional fields, with emphasis upon those of special benefit to the citizens of Pennsylvania;
- offer superior graduate programs in the arts and sciences and the professions that respond to the needs of Pennsylvania, as well as to the broader needs of the nation and the world;
- engage in research, artistic, and scholarly activities that advance learning through the extension of the frontiers of knowledge and creative endeavor;
- cooperate with industrial and governmental institutions to transfer knowledge in science, technology, and health care;
- offer continuing education programs adapted to the personal enrichment, professional upgrading, and career advancement interests and needs of adult Pennsylvanians; and
- make available to local communities and public agencies the expertise of the University in ways that are consistent with the primary teaching and research functions and contribute to social, intellectual, and economic development in the Commonwealth, the nation, and the world.

The trustees, faculty, staff, students, and administration of the University are dedicated to accomplishing this mission, to which they pledge their individual and collective efforts, determined that the University shall continue to be counted among the prominent institutions of higher education throughout the world.

Guide to Fact Book Definitions

Many terms in higher education are interpreted similarly by any institution, however, there are some terms uniquely defined by each institution. The following are terms used in the *Fact Book* as they are defined by the University of Pittsburgh.

CALENDAR

<u>Academic Year</u> The year beginning September 1 and ending August 31. Terms include Fall Term (September to December), Spring Term (January to April), and Summer Term (May to August).

Fiscal Year The year beginning July 1 and ending June 30.

DEGREE AND CERTIFICATE PROGRAMS

<u>Certificate Category</u> A certificate classification which includes: Certificate (CERT), Advanced Certificate (ADVCT), Advanced Certificate - Master's Level (ADVCTM), Advanced Certificate - Doctorate Level (ADVCTD).

<u>Certificate Program</u> An academic program whose completion is recognized by conferring upon the student an award referred to as a certificate.

<u>Degree Category</u> A degree classification which includes: Associate, Baccalaureate, Master's, Doctorate, First Professional.

<u>Degree Program</u> An academic program whose completion is recognized by conferring upon the student an award referred to as a degree. Specialized degree programs, and majors, include:

<u>Combined Major</u> An academic program which enables students who have completed a specified number of undergraduate credits to receive a bachelor's degree upon completion of a specified number of credits in certain University of Pittsburgh post-baccalaureate programs.

<u>Cooperative Degree Program</u> An academic program administered by two or more institutions.

<u>Dual-Degree Program</u> An academic program whose requirements include all or most of the requirements for two distinct academic degree programs within a school and for which two degrees are awarded.

<u>Dual (Double) Major Program</u> An academic program whose requirements include the completion of two distinct majors and which results in the award of a single degree.

<u>Interschool Certificate/Degree Program</u> An academic program administered by two or more schools within the institution and for which one certificate or degree is awarded.

<u>Joint Degree Program</u> An academic program whose requirements include all or most of the requirements of two distinct academic degree programs administered by two or more of the University's schools and for which two degrees are awarded.

<u>Self-Design Major</u> A major whose requirements are focused within two or more subject areas and which results in the award of a single degree.

<u>Degree Type</u> A specific degree within a degree category, for example, BA, MA, PhD, MD.

FACULTY AND STAFF

<u>Academic Rank</u> A categorization which includes: professor, associate professor, assistant professor, instructor, and lecturer.

<u>Instructional Faculty</u> Those University faculty associated with teaching activities, as defined by the American Association of University Professors.

Race This classification taxonomy includes: Black Non-Hispanic (African American), American Indian/Alaskan Native (Native American), Asian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic, and White Non-Hispanic.

Tenure A status accorded to those members of the University's faculty who have demonstrated high ability and achievement in their dedication to the growth of human knowledge.

STUDENTS

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment A calculated number derived by adding the number of full-time students to 40 percent of the number of part-time students.

Level

First Professional Students Those students enrolled in the professional degree programs of Medicine, Dental Medicine, Pharmacy, and Law, leading to the degrees: MD, DMD, PharmD, JD, and LLM.

<u>Graduate Students</u> Those students enrolled in programs leading to a graduate degree or certificate. Also included are those students who hold a baccalaureate degree or the equivalent and who are enrolled for graduate coursework but who are not seeking a graduate degree or certificate.

<u>Undergraduate Students</u> Those students enrolled in programs leading to an undergraduate degree or certificate. Also included are those students who are enrolled for undergraduate coursework but who are not seeking an undergraduate degree or certificate.

Race The U. S. Department of Education's classification taxonomy includes: Non-Resident Alien (International), Black Non-Hispanic (African American), American Indian/Alaskan Native (Native American), Asian/Pacific Islander, Hispanic, and White Non-Hispanic.

Status

Full-time students Undergraduate students registered for 12 or more credits in a term. Graduate students and first professional students registered for 9 or more credits in a term.

<u>Part-time students</u> Undergraduate students registered for fewer than 12 credits in a term. Graduate students and first professional students registered for fewer than 9 credits in a term.

UNIVERSITY STRUCTURE

<u>Campus</u> One of the five geographic locations in Pennsylvania of the University: Pittsburgh, Johnstown, Greensburg, Titusville, Bradford.

<u>School</u> An academic unit responsible for the administration of the institution's academic programs.




Headcount Enrollment by Level, Status, Residency, and Race Pittsburgh Campus Fall Term, 2003











Headcount Enrollment by Age, Level, and Status Pittsburgh Campus Fall Term, 2003







Headcount Enrollment by Pennsylvania County Total University Fall Term, 2003

TBUSINESS: Also available is the dual-degree program within the Katz Graduate School of Business, MBA/MS, and joint degree programs between the Katz Graduate School of Business and the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, MBA/MA, between Katz Graduate School of Business and Engineering, MBA/MSIE, between the Katz Graduate School of Business and Law, MBA/JD, between the Katz Graduate School of Business and Public and International Affairs, MBA/MPIA, and between the Katz Graduate School of Business and Public Health, MHA/MPH (the interschool degree program in Health Administration, MHA, is offered through the Katz Graduate School of Business and Public Health). A cooperative degree program is available between the Katz Graduate School of Business and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, MBA/MDiv.

⁸Business: A specially-designed, less than two-year, MBA program. The Executive MBA Program is offered to experienced executives in the United States while the International Executive MBA Program to individuals at various international locations.

⁹Business: A degree program in which the MIB degree is offered in conjunction with the MBA.

¹⁰Education: The MAT (in Elementary and Secondary Education) and MEd (in Special Education) degree programs culminate in the University recommending those students, who have completed the requirements, for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania Instructional Certificate I. The School of Education offers another program option leading to teacher certification, referred to as the professional year program. In this one-year, non-degree program, the student, having received the baccalaureate degree in an arts and sciences major, enrolls in the School of Education as a postbaccalaureate student. A professional year program option exists for those students who wish to pursue the emphasis in Early Childhood Education.

¹¹Engineering: Also available is the dual-degree program within Engineering, MSChE/MSPE, and joint degree programs between Engineering and the College of Arts and Sciences, BSE/BA and BSE/BS, and between Engineering and the Katz Graduate School of Business, MSIE/MBA.

¹²Law: Also available are joint degree programs between Law and the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, JD/MA (Bioethics), between Law and the Katz Graduate School of Business, JD/MBA, between Law and Public and International Affairs, JD/MPA, JD/MPIA, and JD/MID, and between Law and Public Health, JD/MPH. ¹⁴Public and International Affairs: Also available within Public and International Affairs is a dual-degree program, MPA/MPIA, MPA/MID, and MPIA/MID, a joint degree program between Public and International Affairs and the Katz Graduate School of Business, MPIA/MBA, and joint degree programs between Public and International Affairs and Law, MPA/JD, MPIA/JD, and MID/JD, between Public and International Affairs and Social Work, MPA/MSW, MPIA/MSW, and MID/MSW, between Public and International Affairs and Information Sciences, MPA/MSIS, MPIA/MSIS, and MID/MSIS, and between Public and International Affairs and Public Health, MPA/MPH, MPIA/MPH, and MID/MPH.

¹⁵Social Work: Also available are joint degree programs between Social Work and Public Health, PhD/MPH, and between Social Work and Public and International Affairs, MSW/MPA, MSW/MPIA, and MSW/MID, and cooperative degree programs between Social Work and Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, MSW/MDiv, and between Social Work and Hebrew Union College, MSW/MAJCS. Students meeting established requirements may participate in programs that the School of Social Work administers in cooperation with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the U.S. Administration for Children and Families, and in participation with all other accredited and approved universities in Pennsylvania. Programs that are offered: at the graduate level, the Child Welfare Certificate Program (CWCP) and the Child Welfare Education for Leadership (CWEL) Program; at the undergraduate level, the Child Welfare Education for Baccalaureates (CWEB) Program.

¹⁶Information Sciences: Also available are joint degree programs between Information Sciences and Public and International Affairs, MSIS/MPA, MSIS/MPIA, and MSIS/MID.

¹⁷Nursing: Includes specialties in Acute Care Nurse, Family Nurse, Pediatric Nurse, and Psychiatric Primary Care Nurse.

¹⁸Nursing: In addition to the traditional BSN program, also available is the BSN-Accelerated Program which is a specially-designed program for individuals who have 90 credits earned towards, or have, a baccalaureate degree in another field. The program enables individuals to earn the BSN at an accelerated rate.

¹⁹Nursing: A specially-designed program for individuals who are practicing RNs. This program expedites their completion of the requirements for the BSN.

²⁰Nursing: A specially-designed program for individuals who are practicing RNs. This program prepares RNs for advanced practice in specific nursing areas while enabling them to complete the requirements for both the BSN and MSN degrees.

²¹Nursing: Includes specialties in Nursing Administration, Nursing Education, Nursing Informatics, and Nursing Research.

²²Pharmacy: The PharmD curricula accommodates students who have completed two years of study in the College of Arts and Sciences and are entering the PharmD program as undergraduates and those individuals who already have the BSPhr degree and want to now complete the requirements for the PharmD degree.

²⁴Public Health: An interschool degree program offered through Public Health and the Katz Graduate School of Business. ²⁵Medicine: Also available are joint degree programs between Medicine and the Faculty of Arts and Sciences, MD/MA (Bioethics) and between Medicine and Public Health (MD/MPH). Students are not admitted at the master's level of the doctoral degree programs listed. Master's degrees are available, in accordance with departmental guidelines, to those students who complete fewer credits than are required for the PhD degree.

²⁶Education and Public Health: An interschool degree program offered jointly through Education and Public Health.

²⁷Nursing and Public Health: An interschool certificate program offered jointly through Nursing and Public Health.

²⁸Titusville: Also available is a cooperative program with the Bradford Campus which enables students to receive the BS in Business Management. Students remain at the Titusville Campus for their third and fourth years of study and take upper-level courses taught by Bradford Campus faculty.

²⁹Bradford: Also available are the non-degree, postbaccalaureate elementary teacher certification program and the non-degree, postbaccalaureate secondary teacher certification program in cooperation with the Pittsburgh Campus' School of Education. Students may seek teacher certification for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and or the State of New York. 











Library Collections and Services

Library Collections and Services

The University of Pittsburgh libraries and collections provide an abundant amount of information and services to the University's students, faculty, staff, administrators, and researchers of the University. In fiscal year 2003, the University's 29 libraries and collections have surpassed 4.7 million volumes, more than 4.4 million pieces of microforms, more than 25,500 print subscriptions, and more than 9,000 electronic journals.

Under the administration of the Director, who serves as the University Librarian, the University Library System (ULS) includes the following libraries and collections: Hillman (main), African American, Buhl (social work), East Asian, Special Collections, Government Documents, Allegheny Observatory, Archives Service Center, Center for American Music, Chemistry, Computer Science, Darlington Memorial (American history), Engineering (Bevier Library), Frick Fine Arts, Information Sciences, Katz Graduate School of Business, Langley (biological sciences, behavioral neuroscience, psychology), Mathematics, Music, Physics, and Public and International Affairs/Economics. The ULS also maintains a high density storage area at the Library Resource Facility in the Point Breeze section of Pittsburgh. Libraries are located at each of the University's four regional campuses.

The Hillman Library is the largest library facility with seating for 1,530 users. It offers an open stack arrangement and an extensive range of library services. In addition to the main collection, which is comprised primarily of humanities and social sciences subject areas, the Hillman Library is comprised of five other libraries and collections, and houses maps, national and international newspapers, and microform facilities.

Outside of the University Library System are the Barco Law Library and the Health Sciences Library System.

The Health Sciences Library System (HSLS) provides collections and services to meet the information needs of the educational, clinical, and research programs of the Schools of Medicine, Dental Medicine, Pharmacy, Health and Rehabilitation Sciences, Nursing and the Graduate School of Public Health, as well as the hospitals of the UPMC Health System. The HSLS includes Falk Library of the Health Sciences, the Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic Library and the Libraries at UPMC Shadyside. The Computer and Media Center in Falk Library is the primary health sciences facility and service point for audiovisual and microcomputer resources. HSL Online (www.hsls.pitt.edu) is the gateway to extensive electronic resources for clinical and research needs.

PITTCAT is the University of Pittsburgh's online library catalog, offering author, title, subject, and keyword access to materials to all University libraries. PITTCAT currently contains bibliographic holdings and circulation information for more than four million titles, representing most of the book and periodical collections in the University's libraries. In addition, the University libraries provide access to many remote resources for University of Pittsburgh faculty, students, and staff, including: Encyclopedia Britannica, netLibrary, EBSCOhost, InfoTrac, CIS Compass, Web of Science, MUSE, JSTOR, Science Direct, and numerous other electronic journals. PITTCAT and other databases are available through the ULS website at www.library.pitt.edu.

Computing Services and Systems Development

Computing Services and Systems Development

Information technology has become an integral part of the academic and research mission of the University of Pittsburgh. Worldwide computing, networked information, online collaborations, and technology-delivered instruction are now daily experiences at the University's five campuses. Computing Services and Systems Development (CSSD) provides the infrastructure, resources, and support for these services, which are utilized by nearly every student, faculty, and staff member.

The University of Pittsburgh is showcased on the Internet at www.pitt.edu. CSSD maintains an information technology Web site at technology.pitt.edu.

Network and Telecommunications Environment

provides the network infrastructure telecommunications backbone for the University community. The University's data network, PittNet, operates over a gigabit backbone that joins hundreds of local Ethernets into a large, geographically-distributed network and connects thousands of computers at all five University campuses to the Internet. High speed, reliable 100mbs Ethernet connections are the standard for University offices. The undergraduate residence halls are fully wired, with one Ethernet port per student. An extensive consulting and support program is available in the residence halls to support student computing. While off-campus, students, faculty, and staff have access to PittNet through a modem pool of nearly 800 modems. In addition, the Secure VPN Service (https://sslvpn.pitt.edu) provides students, faculty, and staff with a convenient way to access restricted online library journals, databases, and other University resources at any time and from any location.

CSSD also offers wireless network access for students in designated public areas on the Pittsburgh campus including Hillman Library, the Cathedral of Learning's Commons Room and lawn, the second floor of Posvar Hall, the Petersen Events Center's food court/study area, and the William Pitt Union's student lounge, café, front lawn, and patio. Any student with a laptop computer and the required wireless network card may use the service to access PittNet and the Internet from these convenient locations. CSSD's future plans are to offer the service to faculty and staff and to add new locations on campus.

The University's Web portal, my.pitt.edu, provides students, faculty, and staff with a single point of Web access to the information and applications that they use most at the University. The portal makes it possible to check e-mail, view grades and class schedules, pay tuition bills online, and read local news and weather from one convenient location. The portal interface can also be customized according to a user's preferences.

Extensive telecommunications support is provided to more than 26,000 telephones. Telephone service to the residence halls is also provided. Voice mail, cellular phones, calling cards, and audio conferencing are available as well.

Resource Environment

The Technology Help Desk is available 24 hours a day, seven days per week, by calling 412-624-HELP [4357] or by submitting a problem report online at technology.pitt.edu. The Technology Help Desk provides troubleshooting and problem resolution, and answers "how to" questions on a variety of information technology issues. Instructional documentation and an online Knowledgebase are also available at the technology.pitt.edu Web site.

Students have access to computing resources and services via six general-purpose computing labs and a productivity computing lab at the Pittsburgh campus. The labs offer students access to more than 600 computers running Windows, Macintosh, Linus, and Unix. Computers are equipped with more than 200 of the latest software applications and tools as well as CD writing capability and USB ports. Each lab features several media stations that offer CD duplications, scanning, and image processing capabilities. Printing services include high-speed print capability in all facilities and color laser print capability in the David Lawrence Hall computing lab. Lab hours and locations are available at technology.pitt.edu. In addition, more than 100 e-mail kiosks are distributed throughout the Pittsburgh campus, providing convenient locations for students to check their e-mail or to browse the Web between classes.

CSSD's spam and virus e-mail filtering service stops dangerous viruses and unwanted e-mail from reaching the @pitt.edu e-mail addresses of students, faculty, and staff. The service will soon be available for departmental e-mail addresses as well. Students, faculty and staff can also use the Pitt Software Update Service at updates.pitt.edu, to protect their Windows computers from viruses and security vulnerabilities. The Pitt Software Update Service downloads and installs the latest Microsoft security updates and service packs locally from the University's network.

The University's timesharing service consists of the UNIX, VMS, and MVS environments. Software applications include the database management systems, graphical analysis programs, mathematical and statistical programs, simulation packages, and tape/file transfer utilities that are supported by these systems.


CSSD has implemented a Central Directory that is the authoritative, centralized database of all individuals affiliated with the University. It includes information about students, faculty, and staff as well as various other classifications of individuals associated with the University. A unique feature of the Central Directory is the Finding People service which allows users to conduct a search for individuals at Pitt, using their last name or University Computer Account username.

Support Environment

Computing Services and Systems Development offers a consulting and evaluation service to University departments on a contract basis. Through the contract program, systems analysts and technical professionals can be hired, from one to five days per week, to provide dedicated, high-level, on-site consulting. CSSD has also established the Expert Partners program to provide departmental technical staff with access to CSSD resources and liaison and training services. This program is designed to assist the departmental staff analyst in delivering high-quality support within his or her own department, coordinated with the overall direction of services provided by CSSD.

Students are provided an extensive array of free software applications and utilities. The Microsoft Campus Software for Students program provides Microsoft applications and operating systems to Pitt students free of charge. Students can receive software upgrades while enrolled at the University and may retain the software when they graduate. CSSD also offers mathematics, statistics, utility, and Internet software products that are either provided without charge or at a greatly reduced cost.

In addition, CSSD provides the University with an Electronic Software Distribution service (software.pitt.edu) that permits students, faculty, and staff to install software that is available free of charge according to the University's enterprise and site license agreements.



Institutional Advancement

The mission of the Office of Institutional Advancement is to "Inform and Involve to Inspire Investment." To achieve this mission, Institutional Advancement seeks to: 1) inform alumni and friends about the University through personal visits, coordinated events, targeted communications, and stewardship activities; 2) to involve alumni and friends in the life of the University; and 3) to inspire alumni and friends to help shape the University's future through their investment of philanthropic gifts.

The University of Pittsburgh's \$1 billion Discover a World of Possibilities fund-raising campaign reached \$602.5 million in gifts and pledges in 2003. A major focus of the campaign has been to increase the number of University endowed funds. At the end of fiscal year 2003, the University had 1,343 endowed funds, a 49% increase from the number of funds at the beginning of the campaign. Another focus has been to reach out to Pitt alumni and friends, not only in the local area, but also across the nation and throughout the world. At the end of the fiscal year, 54% of the gifts from individuals came from those outside of the Pittsburgh metropolitan area.

In fiscal year 2003, the University acquired in excess of \$94 million in outright gifts from private sources, making this the most successful fundraising year in the University's history. Of this total, alumni gave nearly \$25 million (26 percent), corporations gave \$14 million (15 percent), foundations gave \$30 million (32 percent), while other individuals, groups, and sources gave \$26 million (27 percent).

Institutional Advancement's staff members promote and mobilize volunteer activities in support of fund-raising, coordinate alumni advocacy efforts, and perform other functions to support the University's mission. One important fund-raising program is the Annual Fund, which provides potential donors with opportunities to support the University at every dollar level. From small donations which help fund day-to-day operations to large gifts which endow entire programs, the generous support of devoted Pitt alumni, friends, parents, faculty, and staff is critical to Pitt's mission. In fiscal year 2003, nearly 38,000 donors made gifts to the University's Annual Fund, making it the most successful year in its history.

Institutional Advancement's Planned Giving department assists friends and alumni in arranging charitable gifts that are executed over an extended period of time or at some point in the future. These contributions, which may provide powerful tax benefits and sources of income to donors, can be made through gifts of life insurance, life income gifts, or through a number of other donor-friendly options.


Members of the staff of Corporate and Foundation Relations act as liaisons between individuals at the University – faculty or various other departmental personnel – and representatives of local, national, and international corporations and foundations. The purpose of this effort is to connect University funding needs with the philanthropic interests of donor organizations. In addition, the University participates in a corporate matching gift program through which numerous corporations match eligible gifts made to the University by their employees.

The Office of Alumni Relations and the University of Pittsburgh Alumni Association together promote mutually productive relationships between the University and its alumni, who number more than 220,000 and who reside in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, three U.S. territories, and in 160 foreign countries. Alumni Relations seeks to foster the continued connection of alumni with Pitt after graduation, because alumni are the main link between the University's past and its future. The Alumni Association charters a growing number of Pitt Alumni clubs, works to influence government offices to fund and nurture higher education, and assists the University in its efforts to attract and support highcaliber students. Additionally, Alumni Relations directs the Blue and Gold Society, an organization of outstanding student leaders who represent the University at alumni and community events.

Activities held in the Heinz Memorial Chapel are administered through Institutional Advancement. This Gothic chapel is famous for its magnificent stained glass windows. A focal point of campus life for students, faculty, staff, and alumni, the Chapel provides a place for worship services, concerts, lectures, memorial services, weddings, and individual reflection and meditation.

Voluntary Support by Source of Giving Fiscal Year 1999 to 2003





Voluntary Support by Support Category Fiscal Year 2003





Alumni Residing in Pennsylvania by County 2003








